DRUG AND ALCOHOL CLEARINGHOUSE

A secure online database that allows real time information about CDL driver drug and alcohol violations.

WHO WILL BE AFFECTED BY CLEARINGHOUSE RULES

- School bus drivers
- Limousine drivers
- Municipal vehicle drivers
- Construction equipment operators
- Organizations that have employees subject to FMCSA regulations for drug and alcohol testing
- Interstate and intrastate motor carriers, including passenger carriers

CLREARINGHOUSE AND HIGHWAY SAFETY

Easier for employers to meet pre-employment investigation and reporting obligations.

Make it more difficult for drivers to conceal past violations related to drug and alcohol.

Easier for FMCSA address employer compliance related to testing, investigations, and reporting requirements.



Who has access to the Clearinghouse?

Employers, FMCSA, State Driver Licensing Agencies, and State law enforcement personnel.

When must I start using the Clearinghouse?

January 6, 2020

Employers will be required to conduct electronic and manual queries with previous employees to meet three-year timeframe required by the FMCSA.

Clearinghouse will contain information on all CDL driver drug and alcohol program violations including:

- Positive drug test for specified drugs
- Alcohol use within eight hours of an accident, or until a post-accident test, whichever occurs first
- A refusal to submit to a required drug or alcohol test
- Alcohol use while performing, or within four hours of performing a safety-sensitive function
- A report filed for duty/remain on duty for safety-sensitive function with alcohol concentration of 0.04 or greater
- A report filed for duty/remain on duty while using any drug specified in the regulations (Part 40) other than those prescribed by a licensed medical practitioner

How will I use the Clearinghouse as an employer?

- Report all drug and alcohol violations
- Check to make sure that none of your current employees are prohibited from performing safety-sensitive functions.
- Any driver that is operating a CMV and has a drug or alcohol program violation must complete the return to duty process prior to operating a motor vehicle.
- Encourage CDL drivers to view their own record and be transparent about any previous drug or alcohol program violations and select s Substance Abuse Professional (SAP) if needed.
- Work with Consortium/Third Party Administrators to properly report all drug and alcohol violations and preform driver queries as required.
